NEW SCHOOL CALENDAR ADOPTED BLOOMINGTON STUDENT FEE RESCINDED

Student Government at Bloomington to Lose Most of Income

Claiming that students at Bloomington weren't getting their money's worth, the IU Board of Trustees knocked out the student government fee assessment at its meeting last month. The action will take effect next September.

The fifty-cent fee, which was made mandatory by a decision of the Trustees in 1968 after a campus-wide referendum and which was to be voted on again this spring by the student body-at-large, had been coming under increasing attack from several quarters, including the Indiana Legislature, after it was rumored that Bloomington student body president, Keith Parker, had used some of the annual \$30,000 fund to help pay for his controversial trip to Hanoi late last year. The funds for the trip were later found to have been raised by the National Student Association, which sponsored the trip, and individual students who had canvassed on behalf of Parker and the student government. Some observers have questioned whether it was the funding of the trip or its political propriety which raised eyebrows throughout the state.

Mike King, vice-president of the Bloomington student government group, stated that the Trustee's charge that the fund wasn't reaching most students there was untrue. He cited the group's Legal Aid Service, food cooperative and day-care center as examples of what he felt most students would derive the most benefit from. The student government's budget is pegged around \$46,000 yearly.

One Trustee was quoted as saying, "There's not a corporal's guard interested in any of these programs."

King expressed his belief that perhaps the speaker's program had also played a role in the decision of the Trustees to discontinue the semester assessment, as many have claimed that the speaker's program has been radically-orientated. King pointed out that this was a questionable judgment, as even a Trustee had appeared on the program.

SUTTON OUT, RYAN IN

BLOOMINGTON, Ind.--Because of the loss of his wife who died a month ago, Dr. Joseph L. Sutton resigned as president of Indiana University January 25 to devote his full energies and thoughts to his four children.

Donald C. Danielson, president of the Board of Trustees, who accepted the resignation with regrets, said the I.U. president will be granted a sabbatical, at the end of which he can announce his decision as to future course. Sutton is a tenured member of the faculty with the rank of professor of political science.

Within 72 hours, the Board had chosen a new President for I.U. In one of his first public statements as President of Indiana University, Dr. John W. Ryan described IUPUI and the I.U. regional campuses as "the growing edge of the University. And we must do all possible to continue their support."

"At Indianapolis, we have just

made a significant stride forward. IUPUI is already a major university, and it will benefit from the full force of the University System to maintain the momentum of growth and development. ICFAR--bringing the engineering, health and social sciences resources of Purdue and Indiana Universities to focus on the community needs and interests of Indianapolis as well as the state--is one remarkable illustration of the value of this collaboration, and one which will be closely watched throughout the educational world.

"We must maintain and enhance the excellence for which our university is already noted. Most of the history of Indiana University has been focused at Bloomington...This resource to the State must be maintained in its excellence, yet modified continually to meet the needs of the times."

"High on our agenda will be a hard look at the extensive reorgan-

ization of the University undertaken two years ago. Much progress has been made, but our present position must be evaluated in view of changing needs of the state and institution."

Mrs. Sutton died Dec. 11 after a lingering illness. Dr. Sutton, who had been on leave of absence during the final weeks of her illness, had resumed the presidency on Jan. 7.

Sutton became the 13th president of I.U. in December, 1968, after 15 years on the faculty in which he rose from assistant professor to full professor.

From 1955 to 1958, he directed an I.U. team which established the first Institute of Public Administration in Thailand. Upon his return to the campus he became the first chairman of the Asian Studies Program.

He became associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences in 1962, dean of the college in 1965, and vice president and dean of faculties in 1966.

Fall Semester

To Start Aug. 25

A new academic calendar has been adopted at Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis to make the Christmas holiday a vacation rather than a cram session of preparations for final examinations.

The fall semester--which has traditionally begun in mid-September and straggled into mid-January--will now begin in late August and end shortly before Christmas.

The new IUPUI academic calendar will begin with the 1971-72 academic year.

Registration and enrollment for the fall semester of 1971 will be held in mid-August and classes will begin on August 25. The semester will end on December 22.

Second semester classes will begin on January 13, 1972, and the semester will end on May 12. The IUPUI commencement for the Class of '72 will be held on May 21.

These dates will affect virtually all of the IUPUI undergraduates. There will be variations for some of the IUPUI graduate and professional schools with programs which vary from the traditional semester organization.

Dr. Maynard K. Hine, Chancellor of IUPUI, said the new academic calendar is consistent with the academic calendar for the Indiana University system. "This is a necessary consistency for the students who will take courses in Indianapolis and at other I.U. campuses," said Dr. Hine.

One of the major academic problems eliminated by the new calendar is the lame-duck period between Christmas and the traditional semester end in January.

"This has never been a popular period with either the students or the faculty," said Dr. Hine.

"The new calendar will provide a fairly uninterrupted classroom schedule which ought to improve the performances of the students and their instructors," said Dr. Hine.

The only major break in the first semester will be a three-day break for Thanksgiving. The second semester will have a week-long mid-semester recess.

The new calendar was approved by a faculty-administration committee headed by John G. Williams Jr., IUPUI registrar, and has been approved by the full IUPUI faculty council.

Sexual Revolution

West Lafayette, Ind. (PUNB)—Percentages of college women who had premarital coitus increased dramatically in the 1960's, surveys at three universities show.

These studies show further evidence of a "sexual revolution" in more permissive attitudes toward sex revealed by both men and women students.

The 10-year trends generally are consistent among three groups representing three different cultures, said Harold T. Christensen, professor of sociology at Purdue University.

He surveyed groups of students at two universities in the United States and a university in Denmark. One of the U.S. universities represents the highly restrictive Mormon culture of the Intermountain region; the other represents the moderately restrictive culture of the Middle West. The Danish university represents the highly permissive culture of Scandinavia.

Identical questionnaires were given to 758 students in 1958 and to 898 students in 1968.

The greatest increase in premarital coitus was reported by Danish women. Some 97 per cent in the 1968 survey said they had premarital experience. This is an increase of 37 per cent since the 1958 study.

The increase reported by women from the Intermountain region was from 10 per cent in 1958 to 32 per cent 10 years later. The Middle Western women's percentage increased from 21 to 34.

Percentages of men reporting premarital coitus remained about the same at both U.S. universities for the decade. In 1968, male incidences reported were 37 per cent for the Intermountain region and 50 per cent for the Middle Western.

The 10-year change for Danish males was an increase from 63 per cent to 94 per cent.

Christensen's findings of changes in behavior contradict the position taken by some authorities who contend the sexual revolution is largely confined to greater permissiveness in arts and entertainment—in acceptance but not necessarily in behavior.

Both attitudes and behavior became more permissive during the 1960's, Christensen found.

In another measure of attitudes, students were asked whether pornography should be censored. A majority of both sexes in all three cultures voted against censorship. Rejection of censorship ranged from 57 per cent of Intermountain women to 98 per cent of Danish men. Men were more permissive than women in all three cultures.

Comparison of survey results from 1958 and 1968 shows a reduction of what Christensen calls "value-behavior discrepancy" in all three cultures. That is, fewer persons violated their own standards when they engaged in premarital coitus. He infers that narrowing the gap between the individual's standards and his actual behavior has the beneficial effect of reducing feelings of guilt and remorse.

HFP Oppose News Black Out

A news black out in connection with military activities in southern Laos and northern South Vietnam has been alleged by the steering committee of Hoosiers for Peace as a device to hide from the American public Administration moves to widen war.

Mr. Barton Hunter, chairman of the Indiana peace group, issued the following statement for the Committee:

"The Administration's news embargo on Military events in Laos is an arrogant disregard for the people's right to participate in the affairs of their government and their basic right to be informed of developments which effect their life and reputation.

The only rational argument for the embargo would be military security but when the enemy and most non-American news agencies already are aware of the events we can only assume that the Administration is really concerned with its own political security and has chosen the embargo device to cloak a move which it knows will be unpopular with the majority of the American people.

"Whether or not U.S. ground combat troops are involved in Laos or Cambodia, it appears to us that the President is widening the war through intensive bombing campaigns and American support of South Vietnamese incursions into neighboring

countries. We are grateful, of course, for the decline in U.S. casualties in recent months but feel called upon to point out that an escalation of bombing and encouragement of Asians to kill Asians simply changes the color of the corpse, and this increased slaughter we must condemn.

"The embargo which hides a politically unpopular move also hides from the American people the fact that a widened war will prolong the imprisonment of hundreds of US servicemen incarcerated in North Vietnam. These men will be released only when the U.S. sets a date for the withdrawal of all troops and military involvement in Indo-China.

"The latest Gallup Poll reports that 73 percent of the American people now would urge their Senators and Representatives to support the McGovern-Hatfield resolution which calls upon the U.S. government to withdraw all U.S. troops from Vietnam by the end of 1971. Hoosiers for Peace is joining with a coalition of church, peace and civic organizations to call upon the President and Congress to set the date for the withdrawal of all direct and indirect military involvement in Indo-China by the end of 1971. We urge the President and Congress to set the date for withdrawal in order to: establish a cease-fire and stop the killing of U.S. and Vietnamese; bring the prisoners of war home; and set up an interim government of reconciliation that would be responsible for fair elections.

"We call upon our two United States Senators and eleven members of the House of Representatives to support 'set the date' legislation in this session of Congress so that all American troops can come home from Indo-China no later than December 31, 1971."

Hoosiers for Peace has approximately 2,000 members and fifteen organized chapters in cities and towns throughout the state of Indiana. It was organized in 1967 to work for an end to the war in Vietnam. Among its recent activities was a meeting at Indiana Central College where more than 3,500 people heard Senator Fulbright speak on the situation in Indo-China immediately following the U.S. invasion of Cambodia.

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PURDUE HAS A BLACK CULTURAL CENTER

After months and months of work and preparation, Purdue's Black Cultural Center was officially opened at dedication ceremonies on December 4.

The center, says Dr. Singer A. Buchanan, coordinator of black student programs, is to provide a place for sharing the black experience—not solely for black students and staff members. It is for everyone in the Purdue-Lafayette area.

"We want to provide a facility where anyone feels welcome to come in for discussions, readings, social events—or to just sit down for a while. If people can get to know

a bit more about each other it will go a long way toward mutual understanding and appreciation," said Buchanan.

The center has a library devoted largely to literature of the black experience, several meeting rooms for student organizations, kitchen facilities, a TV lounge area, and a large multi-purpose room for dramatic presentations, social events and larger meetings.

The center will be open to the public every day: 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday, noon until 1 a.m. Saturday, and 2:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Shuttle Busses Being Studied

A transportation system that would link IUPUI campuses, using shuttle buses, is under active consideration. At the direction of Chancellor Maynard K. Hine, a feasibility study is under way. "This is a complex and important problem", Chancellor Hine said. "We are concerned with meeting potential needs, particularly among students, for movement between the various locations where classes will be scheduled."

A committee, including representatives of the IUPUI offices of Student Services and Business Manager, has been evaluating several options, taking into account such factors as operational considerations, costs, and potential usage. A survey of more than 400 students at the Downtown and 38th Street Campuses indicated interest in having such a system available. These preliminary studies have resulted in a proposal that the service be established for a two-month trial period.
